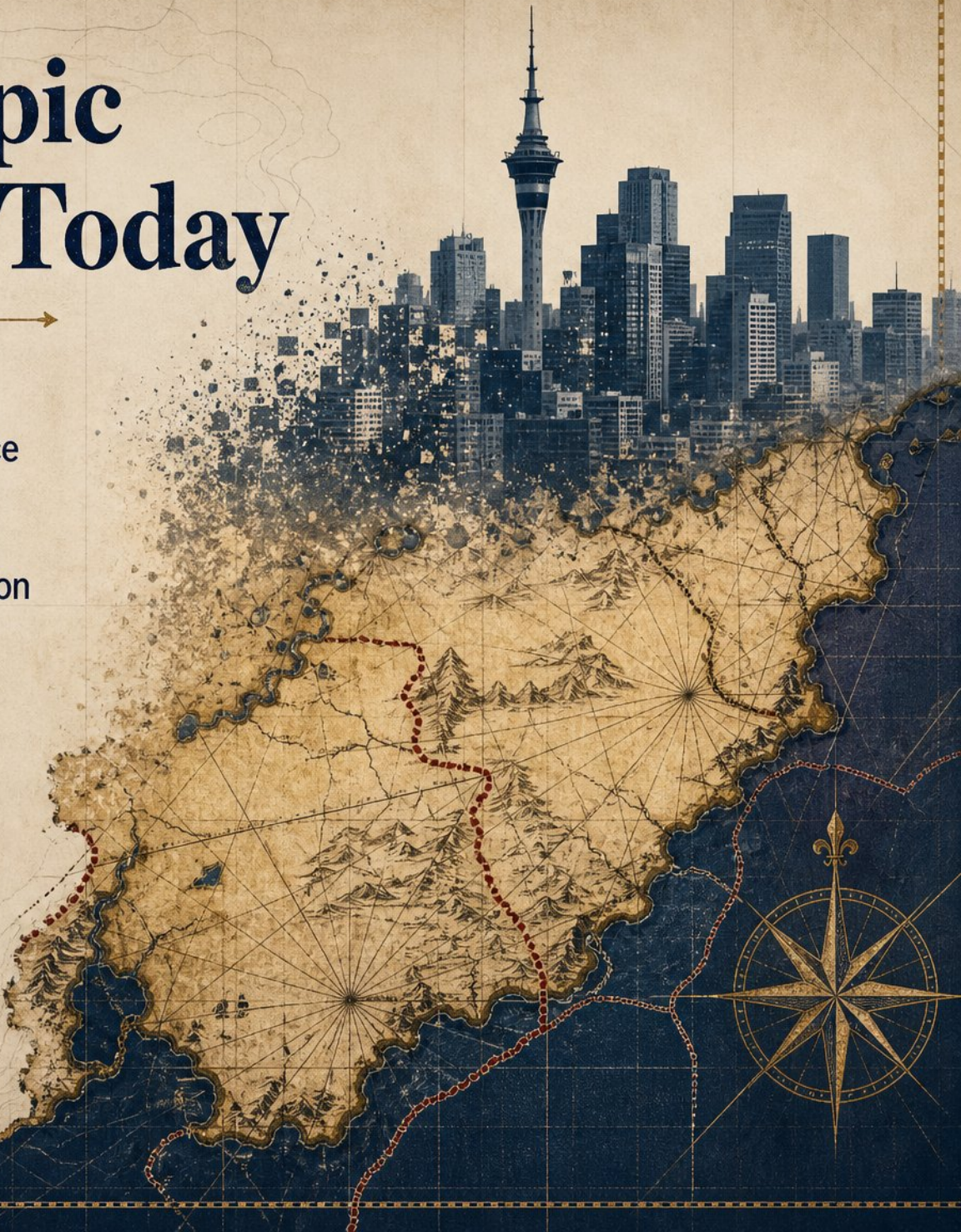

Core Concepts and Terminology



- **Colonialism:** direct political control over a territory.



- **Imperialism:** broader power and influence, including economic.



- **Neo-colonialism:** indirect control, especially economic.

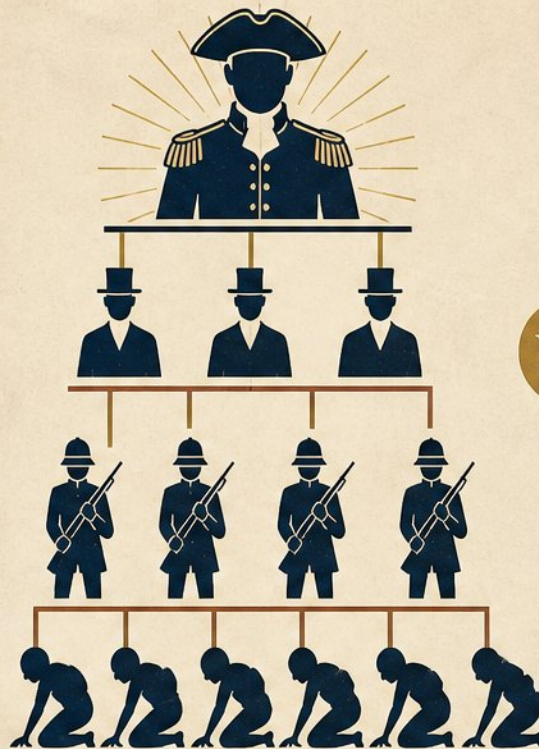


- **Settler colonialism:** colonizers permanently replace the native population.



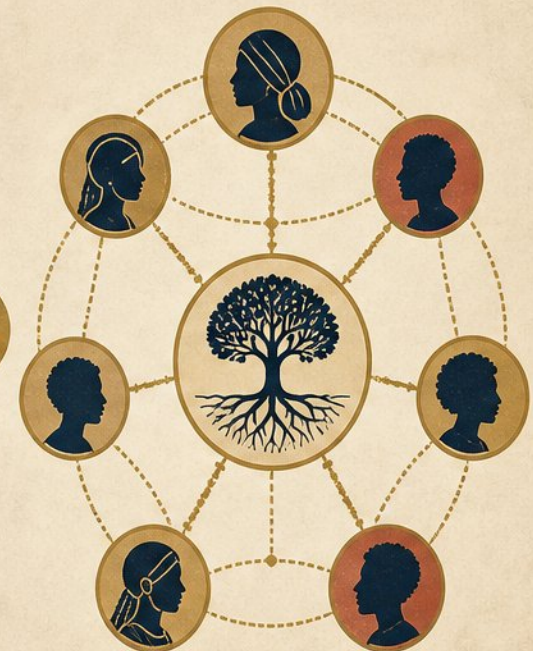
- **Decolonization** is not just diversity; it shifts the power structure.

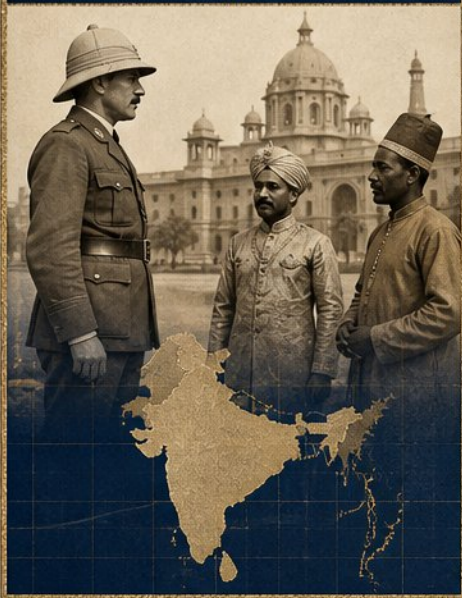
Consolidation, Resistance, and Reconfiguration

- Early mercantile empires focused on trade routes and coastal outposts
- Industrial-era conquest drove inland territorial control
- Key powers: Britain, France, Spain, Portugal, Belgium, Germany
- Drivers: trade, missionary activity, resources, strategic rivalry

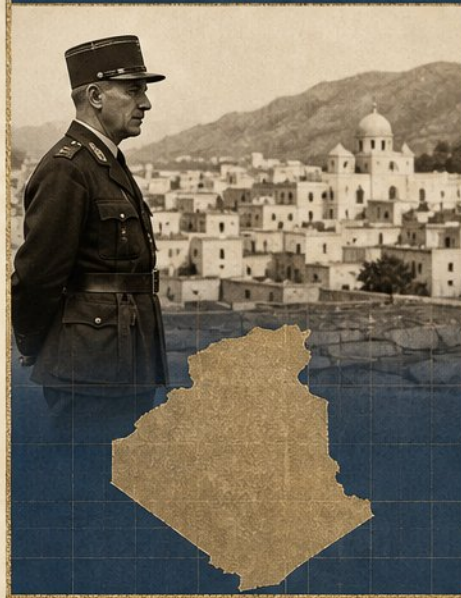
Comparing Colonial Systems and Local Agency



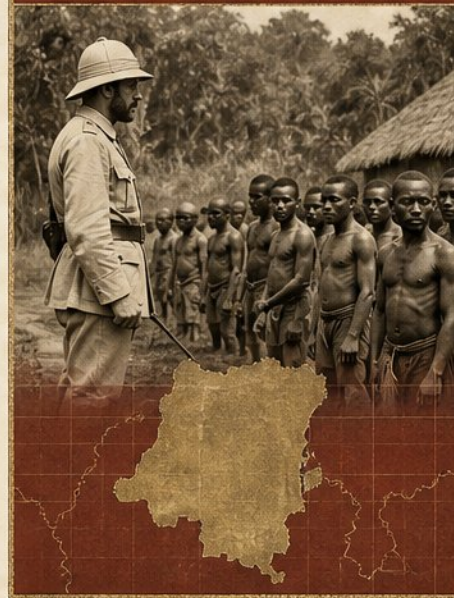

- British India: indirect rule through local elites
- French Algeria: direct rule and settler colonialism
- Belgian Congo: extractive direct rule with extreme violence
- Japanese Taiwan: assimilation-focused colonial administration
- Local agency spans collaboration, everyday negotiation, and open resistance





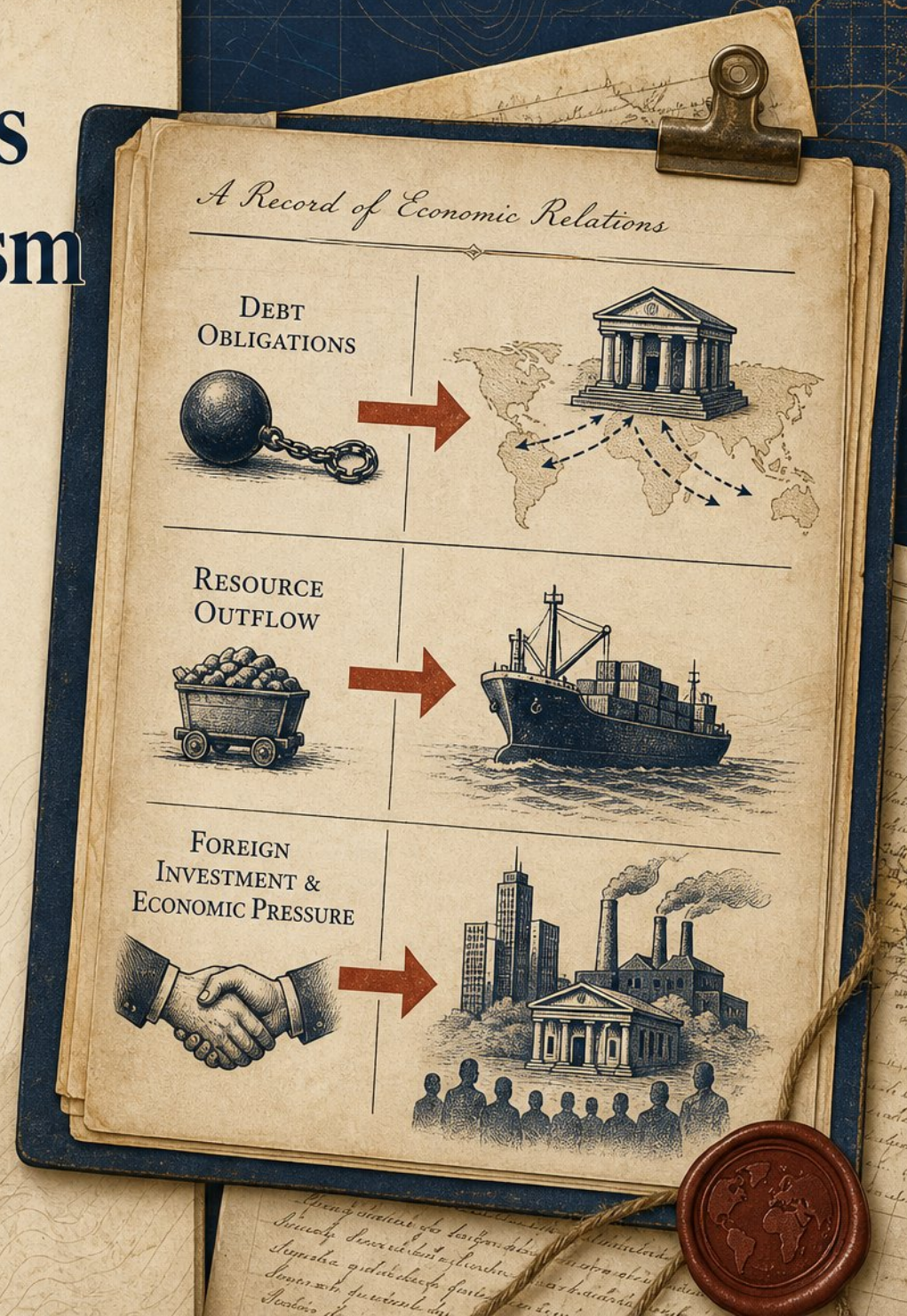
Decolonization Movements and Independence Struggles

- Post-WWII global wave of decolonization
- Negotiated independence versus armed struggle
- Revolutionary paths to national sovereignty
- Key examples: India, Algeria, Vietnam, Ghana
- Independence shaped new international institutions



Economic Legacies and Neo-Colonialism

- Extractive colonial structures persist as uneven debt and trade relations
- Dependency theory explains ongoing post-colonial economic constraints
- Neo-colonialism operates through foreign investment and economic pressure
- Indigenous land disputes expose unresolved resource extraction conflicts



Cultural and Knowledge Decolonization

- Epistemic violence silences non-Western ways of knowing
- Decolonizing education means changing content and teaching methods
- Question universal claims; show where ideas come from
- Move beyond diversification toward deeper structural change
- Key thinkers: Fanon, Said, Ngugi, Spivak



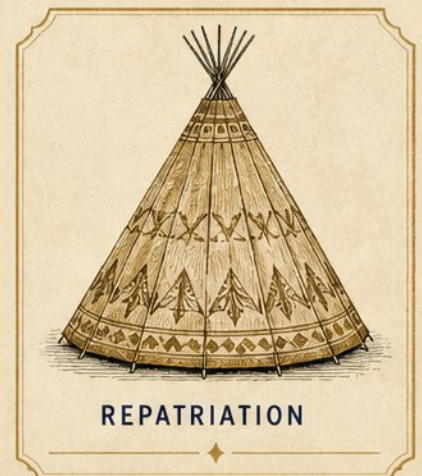
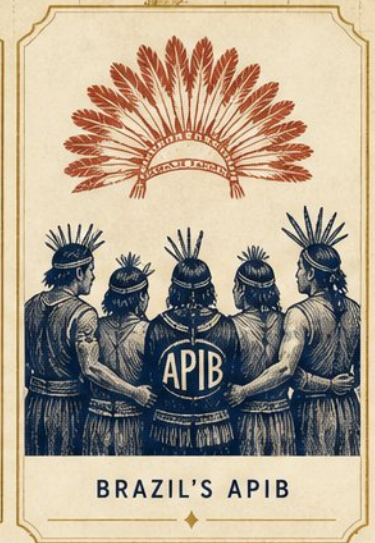
Post-Colonial States and Contemporary Challenges

- - State-building amid inherited borders and ethnic conflict
- - Artificial borders rooted in divide-and-rule strategies
- - Migration and diaspora shape former colony-metropole ties
- - Colonial history still frames citizenship and sovereignty debates



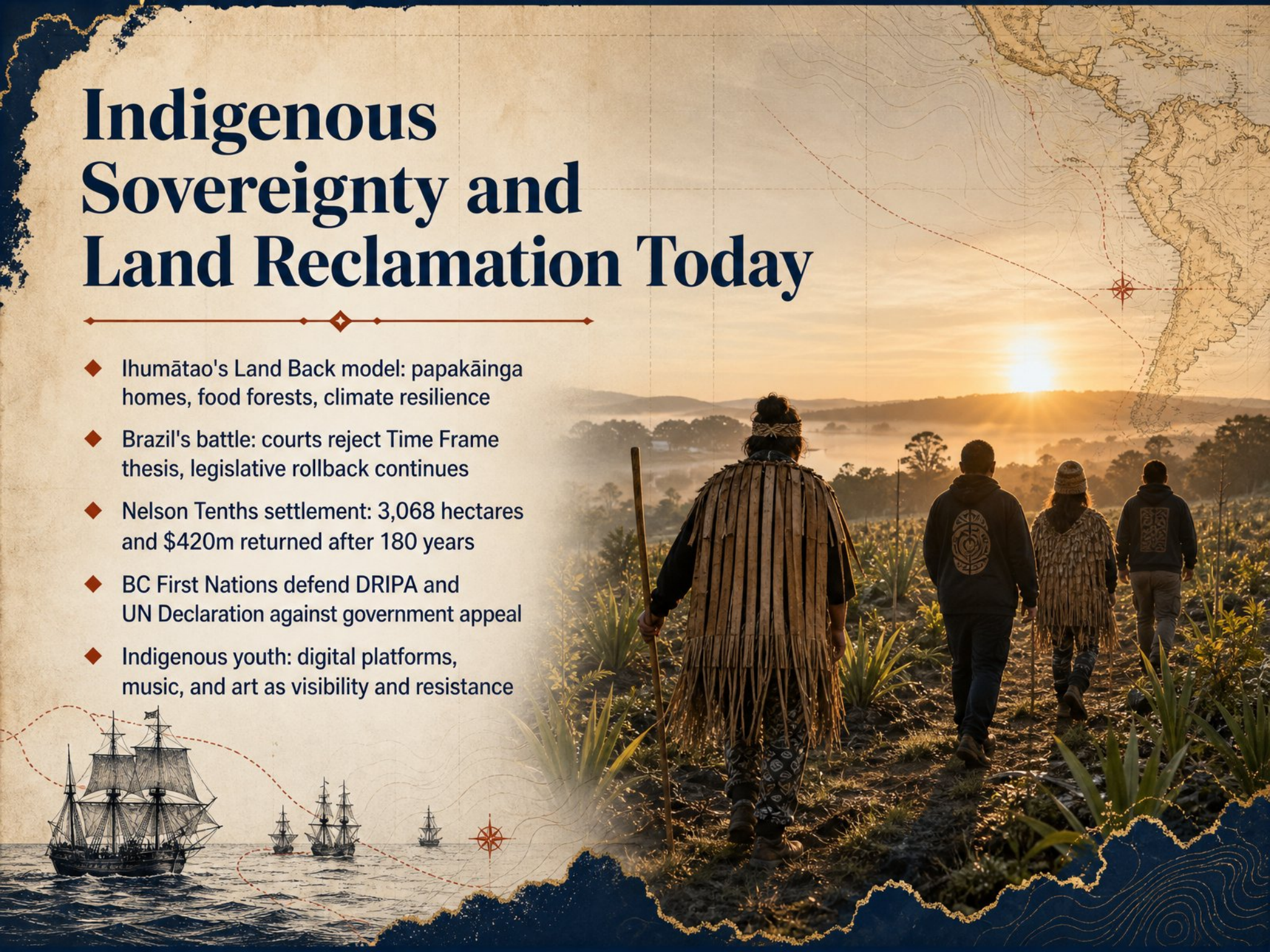
Decolonization in the 21st Century

- Ihumātao: from occupation to papakāinga housing and food sovereignty
- Nelson Tenth's Bill returns 3,068 hectares after 180 years
- Brazil's APIB resists reinterpretations of rejected 'Time Frame' thesis
- Indigenous youth use social media to make land struggles visible
- Repatriation gains ground: Smithsonian returns stolen teepee cover



Indigenous Sovereignty and Land Reclamation Today

- ◆ Ihumātao's Land Back model: papakāinga homes, food forests, climate resilience
- ◆ Brazil's battle: courts reject Time Frame thesis, legislative rollback continues
- ◆ Nelson Tents settlement: 3,068 hectares and \$420m returned after 180 years
- ◆ BC First Nations defend DRIPA and UN Declaration against government appeal
- ◆ Indigenous youth: digital platforms, music, and art as visibility and resistance



Repatriation and Historical Memory

- - Repatriation returns cultural objects, human remains, and stolen land
- - Ethical returns restore dignity and enable cultural revival
- - Oral histories confirm museum records and guide restitution
- - Archives and public memory shape truth-telling and accountability
- - Land returns like Nelson Tenth's and Ihumātao show decolonization in practice

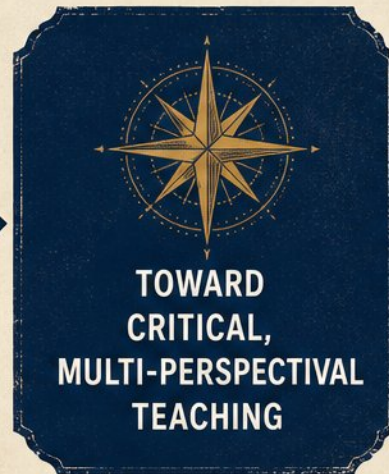
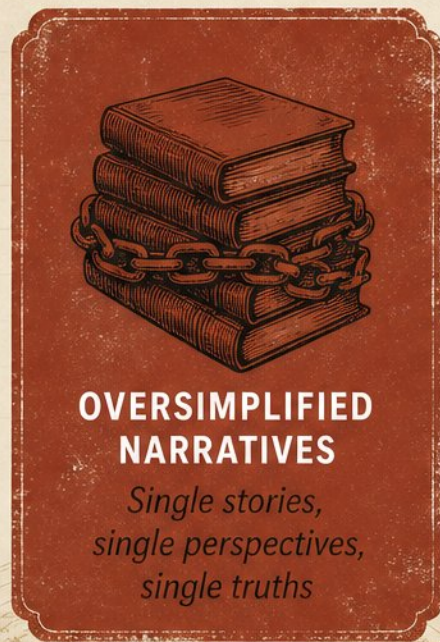

Teaching Colonialism Without Oversimplification



- Use multi-perspectival sources, not token additions



- Contextualize Western theories; highlight their limits



- Prioritize dialogue, reflection, and lived experience



- Reduce hierarchy: students as co-creators of knowledge



- Diversify assessments beyond linear Western argument

- ★ - Avoid extractive framing; center community voices and consent
- ★ - Use plain language, real examples, and transparent sourcing
- ★ - Involve students as co-creators in course and content review
- ★ - Treat decolonization as ongoing, iterative, and collaborative practice



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
